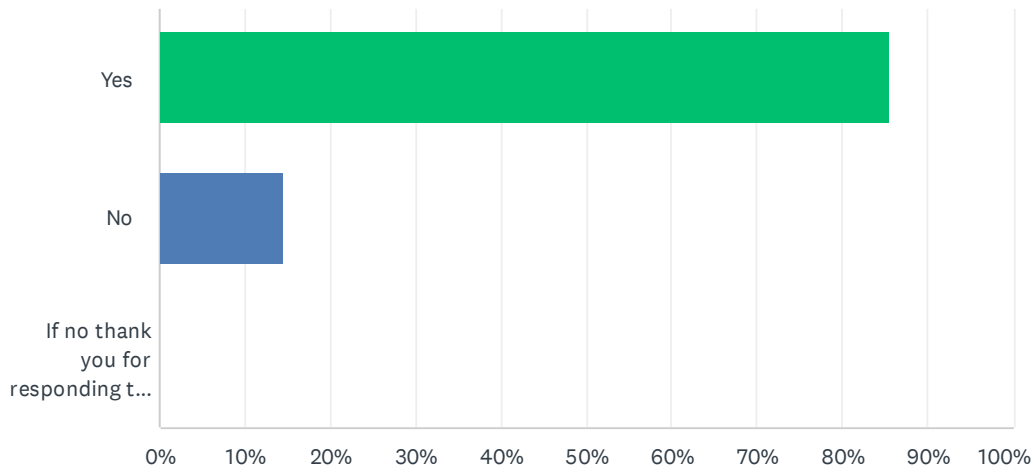


# Q1 Do you live in Cleveland Heights/University Heights?

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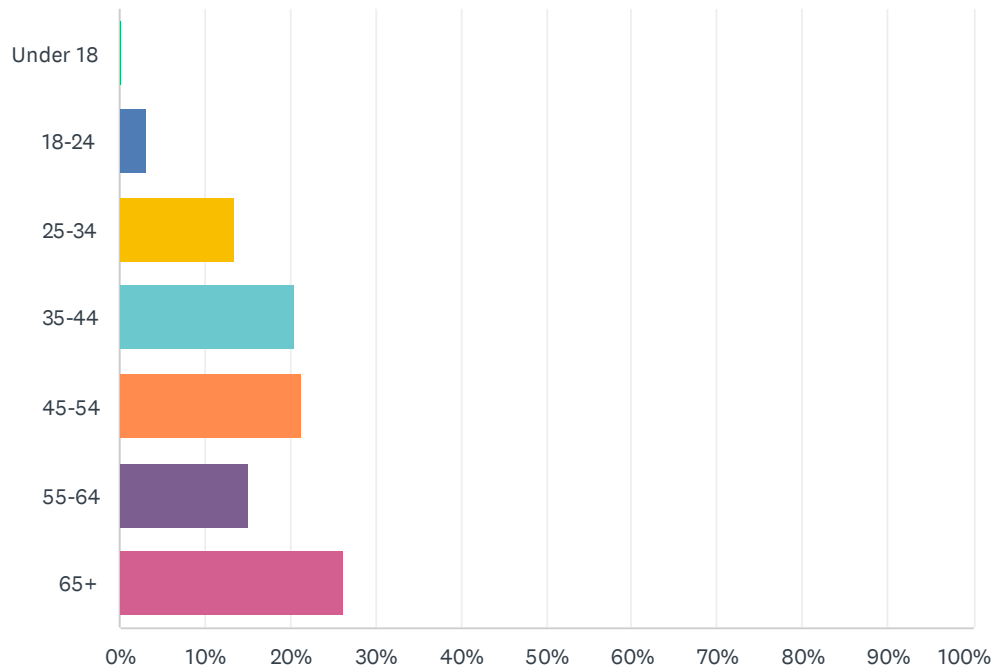

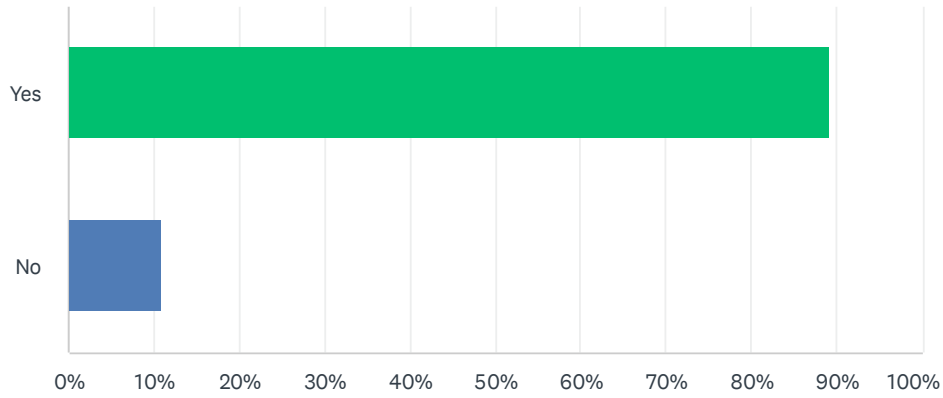

### Q5 Are you aware that the Heights Libraries owns the former Coventry Elementary School Building, also known as the Coventry PEACE Building?

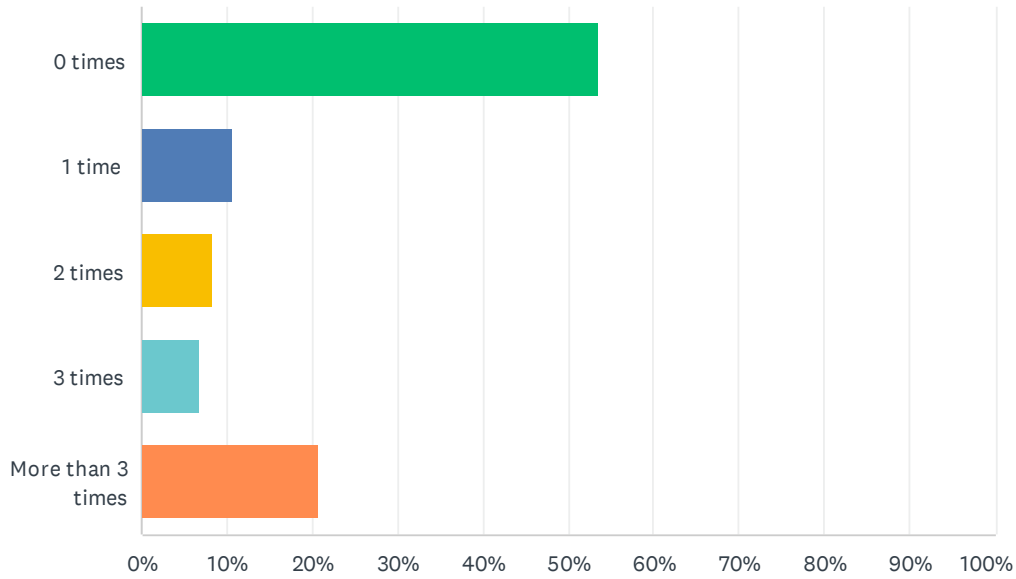

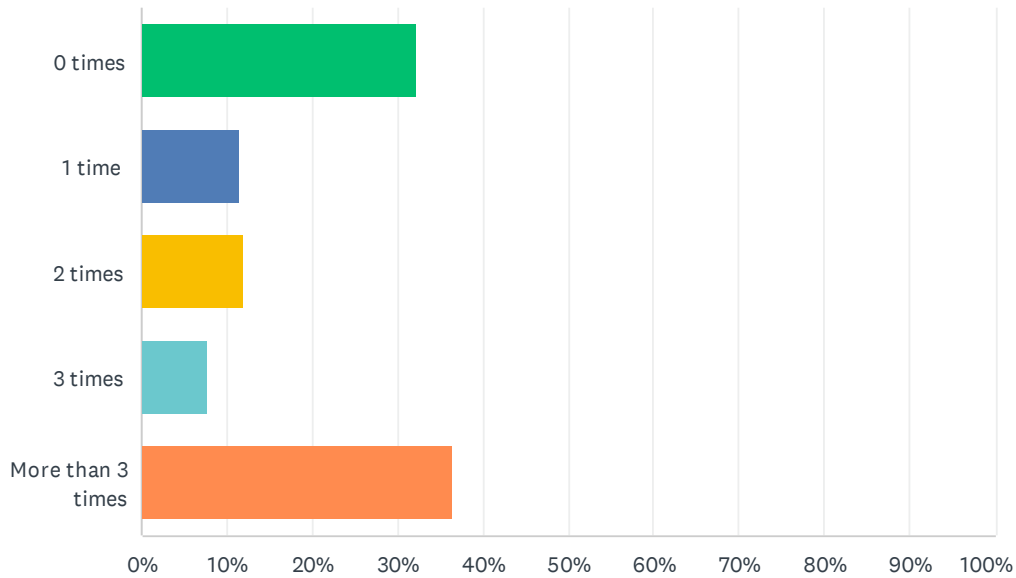

## Q7 During the last 12 months, how many times have you visited the Coventry playground or community space surrounding the PEACE Building?

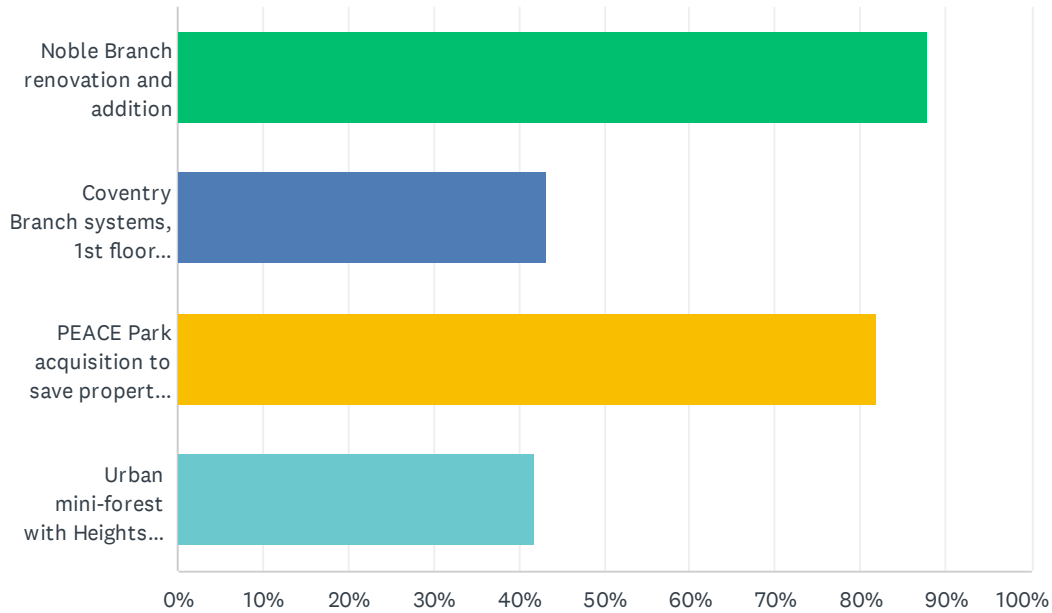

### Q8 Are you aware of improvements the Library has made in the community? Choose any of the following about which you are aware.

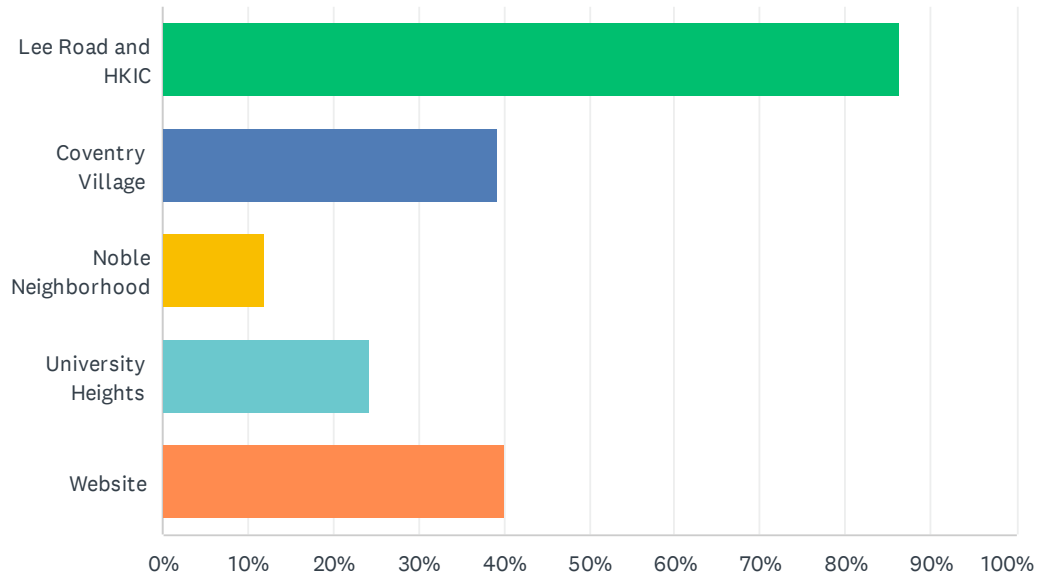

## Q9 If you have visited any of the Heights Libraries at least three times this year, which branches do you frequent?

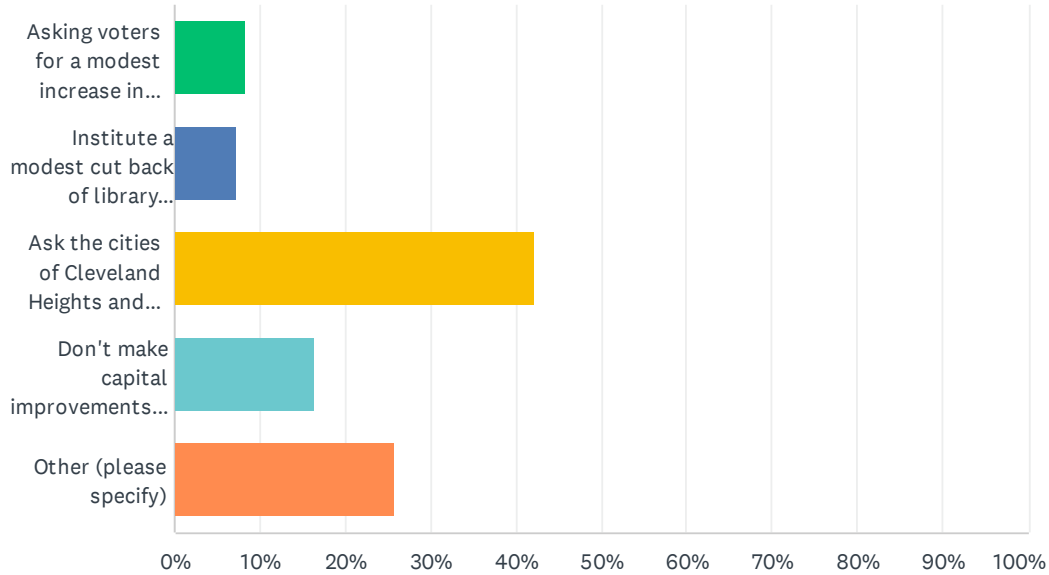

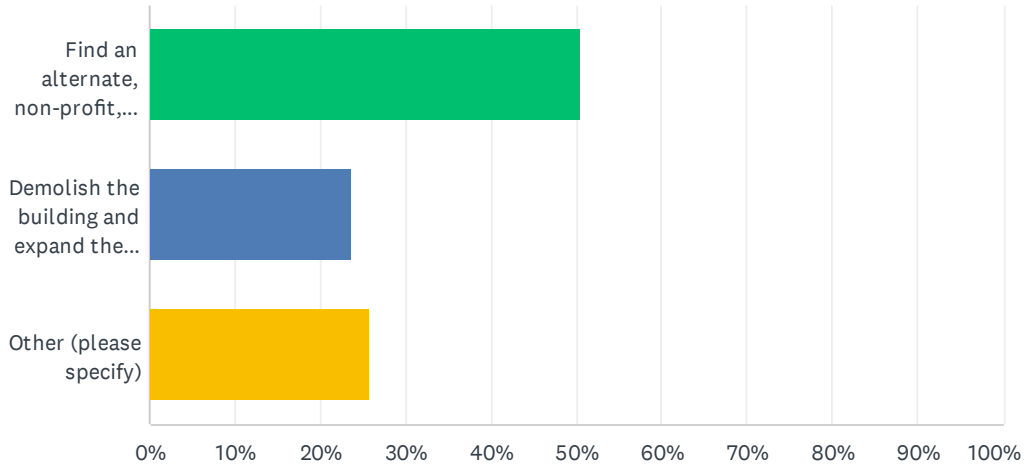

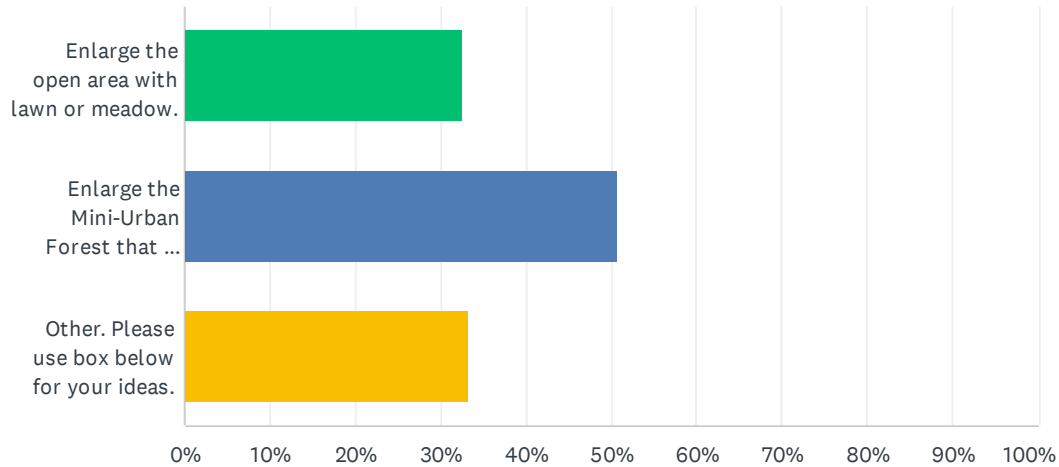
